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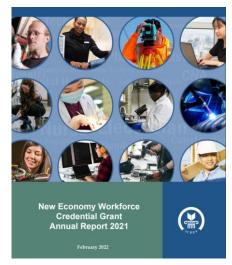


- New Economy Workforce Credential Grant (WCG)
   established by 2016 General Assembly.
  - VCCS branded as FastForward (higher ed centers offer programs too).

#### Three purposes:

- Trains workers in programs aligned with high-demand occupations (closing gap between supply and demand).
- Makes that training and credentialing more affordable for workers.
- Increases the interest of current and future Virginia workers in technician, technologist, and trade-level positions.







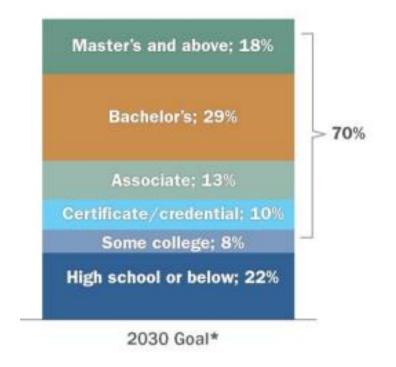
- Eligible institutions: public 2-year institutions & higher education centers.
- SCHEV charged with administering and assessing the program.
- Funding: \$13.5 million (FY 2021).

- Virginia Board for Workforce Development maintains list of highdemand fields.
  - VBWD recommends which WCG programs align with the high-demand list.
- Institution boards approve training programs aligned to those high-demand fields.
  - If additional high-demand fields are identified outside of the annual review process by the board, then eligible institutions may submit approved updates to the board.

- Pay-for-performance:
  - 1<sup>st</sup> third paid by the <u>student</u>.
    - Some financial aid is available.
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> third paid by the <u>state</u> to the <u>institution</u> for training completion.
    - Student pays for 2<sup>nd</sup> third if training incomplete.
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> third paid by the <u>state</u> to the <u>institution</u> for completion of credential.
- Maximum reimbursement per program completion: \$3,000
- Budget language: No program can receive more than 25% of grant funds.

- Pathways to Opportunity sets goal of 70% postsecondary attainment by 2030.
- American Community Survey (ACS) is typical source of education attainment rates by state populations.
- But ACS education attainment only includes categories for Associate degrees and above.
   Additional analysis needed to estimate certificates/licenses.
- Estimates range from 6.3% 7.4% of working age
   Virginians have earned certificate or credential.





#### **Program Highlights**

 Institutions reported 8,904 enrollments in FY 2021, an 19% increase from FY 2020 and the most since the inception of the program. (For-credit enrollment declined 5%)

Unique students increased by 26% (students can enroll in multiple programs).

- Completion and credentialing rates remained relatively stable.
  - 96% complete training.
  - 72% go on to earn credential.

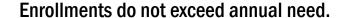

Differences may not represent a shortage as other individuals may complete certification through non-WCG programs.



Not a perfect analysis of Demand – Supply; For example, some individuals may earn credential through non-WCG programs and fill open jobs.



<sup>\*\*</sup>Enrollments figures can include individuals completing multiple credentials. The figures provided for individuals represents unduplicated count of the enrollments.

- Wages were matched through the Virginia Longitudinal Data System with Virginia Employment Commission (VEC) wage records.
  - Excludes individuals not in wage system: unemployed, wages in another system, or selfemployed.
  - Occupation not reported.
  - No indication of hours worked.
- Only used records where one year of pre- and post-wages were matched:
  - 14,439 *program completers* with wages successfully matched.
  - 10,700 *credential earners* with wages successfully matched.

- Training completers' median wages increased \$4,000, or 22%.
- Credential earners' median wages increased \$7,000, or 36%.
- Median wages increased in all industries.
  - Students who earned credentials in construction and extraction earned the highest median wages at \$52,395.
  - Installation, Maintenance, and Repair fields saw the largest median wage *increases* of nearly \$13,000.

#### **Student Costs**

- Average Tuition Paid: \$691.
  - Average General Fund Reimbursed to Providers: \$852
- Workforce Financial Assistance (FANTIC) and G3.
- Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund (GEERF)
  - + Re-Employing Virginians Fund.
- Virginia Ready Scholars.

### 2022 Legislative Update

- House Budget maintains \$13.5 million allocation but with federal stimulus funds instead of GF.
- HB 565 Advanced Manufacturing Talent Investment Program and Fund.
  - Goal of adding 25,000 new credentials in a high demand advanced manufacturing field as identified by the Board of Workforce Development.
  - Similar to Tech Talent Investment Fund
  - Funded at \$2.0 \$2.5 million
- Bill to raise \$1,500 GF reimbursement cap passed by in committee.

#### **Next Steps**

- Update to high-demand occupation list.
- VEDP's Office of Education Economics.
- Monitor federal policy.
- Monitor rate of programs that hit the \$3,000 reimbursement cap.
- Monitor CDL programs for exceeding 25% cap of total GF reimbursement.
