
## 

**Q:** Does higher education pay?

## A: Wages increase with educational attainment.

After graduation, individuals with degrees experience better wage outcomes over time than those with high-school diplomas alone.



## **Findings**

**MEDIAN WAGES:** Ten years after graduation from a Virginia institution, students with a bachelor's degree can expect to earn a median annual wage twice that of someone with a high-school diploma only. (Wage earnings vary by degree level and major type.)

**SUSTAINABLE WAGES:** Three years after graduation, 72% of Virginia graduates working in the Commonwealth earn sustainable wages (above \$23,540).

**CREDENTIALS:** Individuals with a workforce credential (industry certification or state licensure) earn one-third more than those without: \$1,007 per week vs. \$747, respectively.

**TAXPAYER BENEFITS:** People with degrees pay more in taxes and need less government support. On average, associate and bachelor's degree-holders paid an additional \$172,128 and \$381,051 in net taxes over their lifetimes, respectively, compared to just \$25,938 for those with a high-school diploma.

**HEALTH & OTHER BENEFITS:** Individuals with an associate degree or above are 38% more likely to have employer-provided health insurance and those with a bachelor's degree or above are 72% more likely to have a retirement plan.
